Our Short History

Papa Tank Theatre for Inclusion is the brainchild of Bryann Burgess, a local musical theatre artist born with Down Syndrome and Larry Hembree, a local arts administrator who has been mentored by Bryann to understand we all have unique abilities we have the right to explore. 2023 was our pilot year, funded graciously by a Connected Communities grant from Central Carolina Community Foundation.

We learned a lot. We had a blast. We made a lot of new friends. We made mistakes. We had some lightning bolt moments. We laughed. We cried. We danced. We sang. We painted. We drew. We GREW.

Who is Papa Tank?

The theatre gets its name from Papa Tank, the grandfather of co-founder Bryann Burgess. Born and raised in the land of Abraham Lincoln (Springfield, Illinois), he lived by the values of the Gettysburg Address, which proclaimed America "a nation conceived in liberty and dedicated to the proposition that ALL are created equal." A veteran and POW during WWII, Papa Tank never gave up and never compromised his commitment to these values. In the spirit of Papa Tank, the Theatre for Inclusion is about having no limits, determination, and the bravery to try new experiences - all while having fun!

What We Do

We gather a group of young people of all abilities several times a month. We bring in teaching artists to help us create original live theatre. When ready, we share our work with the public.
